2005 AGM - PORTUGAL

The 2005 AGM of the Council of International Investigators will be held in Cascais, Lisbon, Portugal, September 6 through 10, 2005, and will be hosted by our esteemed colleague, Roy Whitehouse. The conference site will be the Hotel Baia, situated in the center of Cascais, about 20 minutes from central Lisbon.

The Board Meeting will be held during the day on Tuesday and Wednesday of the conference, with seminars and speakers scheduled for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday mornings. Seminar topics will include: money laundering, computer fraud, advanced fraud, international criminal prosecution, and international business marketing.

Leisure activities will include trips to both Lisbon and Sintra, a traditional Fado evening, a cocktail reception, and the gala ball.

Confessions Of A Non Tech-Head In A Tech-**Head World**

The following article was written by one of King-Reed Associates' employees, David Quesnel. Brian King introduced me to David Quesnel many years ago. David Quesnel, or Davey Q., to those of us Yankees who could never spell or pronounce his last name, was one of those souls you meet in life whose intensity touched everything and every one around him.

David was the only person I could tell in 1995 that I did not have the courage to admit

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in front of my peers that I could not download a file attached to an email. I could barely figure out how to read and send an e-mail. Proximity to the computer caused me to break out in a cold sweat. David took all that away without insulting my intelligence and was always there to help any one any time with their problems. He opened up a whole new way for me to travel the world in an instant.

In 1505 the frightened crew serving legendary Spanish explorer Juan de Bermudez called Bermuda the "Isle of Devils", because they would hear cries emanating from her shores.

It took 33 years before the crew serving Captain Bartholomew Carreno solved the mystery: Nesting birds.

I'm proud to admit I'm a Jimmy Buffet fan. It's all I can do to stop myself from casting all of this aside and returning to that Pirate side to my personality. I could just drive to Mexico, sell my car, and sit on a beach the rest of my life.

Part of that feeling stems from all the noise of telephones, beepers, keyboards, photocopiers and fax machines. I'm sure I'm not the first person who has had the urge to shake my fist at technology and turn my back on it.

I was born at the tail end of the baby boom and I sit here with wonder at how quickly computers and technology has taken over the world. In high school we would watch as the geeks enthusiastically wrote programs so they could play paddle tennis on green screened behemoth computers.

I wanted to beat guys like that up.
When I started work as a P.I. in 1989, I
didn't have any idea computers would have
anything to do with taking video of Mabel
Whiplash with cigarette dangling from her
mouth as she played Bingo.

Now, there's absolutely no doubt in my mind that computers are here to stay. They

will become easier to use, harder to understand. We are beginning to rely on them for everything. Companies hiring today care less about whether you have a College degree and more on whether you have knowledge in computing. My grandmother asked me a year ago if I had an e-mail address.

Only three years ago, computers didn't have much impact on investigations other than for typists who produced reports in Word Perfect. How we've changed.

Personally, none of this was of any consequence to me until I received my first computer as a Christmas gift in 1994. It was a 386, at a time when the Pentium was already in full force. I remember being excited at the possibility of what it could do (type and edit letters, help track and balance my checkbook, communicate with the outside world). Then the reality hit as I tried to have it do what I wanted. It was as slow as hell on a Monday night.

Computers became de-mystified to me then, because I staunchly refused to pay to have it upgraded. Unlike a car, I swore I would do it myself. What I found was that a computer is an advanced calculator. It does-



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n't think. It doesn't act. It processes what I put into it. No matter what mistake I made, and I made a lot, I learned it would not physically break. I lost the feeling of being overwhelmed and got curious.

In very short order, I threw myself headlong down the garden path of the techno

converted. In my mind, there was nothing that couldn't be done on a computer. There was my entertainment, my productivity, and my life all in one little box. I made friends in far off places of the world. I wrote HTML and designed web pages. I created and hosted an IRC (Internet Relay Chat) channel to make more new friends. I learned Excel, PowerPoint, and word processing. When I found I needed an image for my web site

and couldn't find what I wanted, I created it with paint software. I watched. I tested. I "accidentally" erased hard drives and started over. I built systems. I consulted and consoled a lot of friends.

I did a lot of dumb stuff too. I once spent all night downloading a thirty-second video clip of "Happy Days" and giggled gleefully as I watched it over and over again. I taped

clever quotes from my favorite movies to have a snappy sound file played when I started a program. Something from HAL 9000 of "2001: A Space Odyssey", as I recall: "Dave...what are you doing?"

There's absolutely nothing miraculous about how a computer works. That it can do what it does is spectacular, but it is just a tool. People are afraid of computers because they think they are mysterious. The same person who would happily lift the hood of a car and yank out a clutch is terrified to open that magic box. There's really no mystery to them. And I say this not because I'm

young, or a product of a technically oriented generation. I say it because I've grown to understand the parts, and the process of how a computer works. If I can, you can too.

What computing and the understanding of how it works gave me was the tool to

realize my particular vision for any particular moment. We certainly all see the benefit of using the Internet as a valuable resource for communicating with the outside world, and researching what we need to know, now rather than later. But, as an investigator I saw that with available technology I could conduct



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surveillance, photograph a subject with a digital camera, dictate my report directly into a laptop, process my photos and include them in the report. I could then dial my Internet provider by cellular modem and e-mail my report to the client in two hours. It would give me a competitive edge. It would save time. It would save money. But it isn't even necessary to do all this.

The most interesting thing in computing today is that no matter how small of a step you take, no matter how little you rely on your PC, even the smallest act on it saves expense, time and enhances professionalism.

During my final few years at King-Reed, I

saw the development of imaging in reports, the use of CD-ROM databases, the online searching of DMV records, the use of PowerPoint presentations in speeches, and so on. Computers didn't make us more creative. They made us timelier, and were a perfect place to express our ideas cheaply.

A single PowerPoint Presentation by a professional firm costs nearly \$5,000.00, using the same software you can use for \$4,600.00 less.

The cost of these machines versus the costs and time saved by what they can do and the amount of revenue they can help you generate as a person or a business is absolutely astounding.

I know. It helped me get a career I would never have gotten otherwise.

Is it any wonder at the marvel of all this when my daughter in Barrie, Canada, can desktop publish a report for school on sharks, having done her online research at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute?

Finally, there are a million analogies out there to describe the function, and the individual parts that comprise a computer. Rather than go into detailed explanations, I'd

- rather introduce you to some axioms to ease the learning curve. These will hopefully help you prevent stress during your most troubled times:
- The data created by a manufacturer is replaceable
- The DATA YOU CREATE IS PRICELESS. Treat it that way
- Software, including viruses, can't break hardware
- A \$15 surge protected power bar will one day save you \$1000.00
- CD-ROM's can't be erased.
- Commercial Software and Operating Systems can be reloaded
- Take your time
- Every software package lets you undo or decide not to save if it gets messy
- Save automatically with religious fervor
- Backup your work with religious fervor
- Do not be afraid: virtually anything you do can be undone
- Seek help and ask questions

- Observe others
- Above all else, relax.

I still imagine sitting on that beach in Mexico. The difference is I'll be there with a laptop, writing a novel. Can't get any better than that.

Those of us who attended the event wish to give special recognition to Alana Burke and

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

Treasurer's Report Mid-Year Meeting May, 2005

This report has been prepared for the 2005 Mid Year Meeting of the Council of

International Investigators. The current position of Treasurer for the Council of International Investigators requires more oversight of the Councils finances then

actual day to day activities. The day to day activities continue to be handled by the Council Administrator Shirley Bishop. Shirley Bishop is responsible for issuing and paying the monthly invoices, as well as collecting and depositing the Councils revenues. The monthly bank statements are received by the Treasurer and reviewed and then forwarded on to Shirley Bishop. Copies of the monthly invoices are kept by the Treasurer.

As of April 28, 2005 the bank balance of the Council was \$57,752.94. The 2005 operating budget reflects a projected income for 2005 of \$54,800.00 with projected budgeted expenses of \$\$52,440.00. In previous years the primary budget expenses were for the Directory and the International Councilor. As of 2005 the International Councilor will be posted on the Council's website which will result in a drastic savings in printing and mailing costs. In previous years the budget allocated as much as \$8,200 for the production and shipping/mailing of the International Councilor. The 2005 budget allocates \$2,800 towards the production and posting of the

International Councilor. Some of this savings has been allocated to the website for upgrades to allow for expanded use of the site.

The 2004 Council meetings consisted of the MYM that was held in Malta and the AGM held in Alexandria Virginia. The Malta MYM resulted in a profit for the Council of \$96.11. The AGM, which was the Council 50th Anniversary, resulted in a loss to the Council of \$14,959.95. In accordance with Bylaw Article XI Section 2 paragraph 3 the Council is responsible for underwriting the meetings of the Council therefore \$14,959.95 was disbursed. This was done so after approval by the Board.

The Council's primary source of revenue continues to be derived from membership dues. The Officers and Board members of the Council should ensure that membership,

both retaining existing members and recruiting, remains a focal point of the Council's agenda.

The PODS Make A Comeback

Political, sporting and cultural relations between Ireland and American CII Members are at risk after the truth behind one of the best kept sporting secrets of recent years was finally revealed. All of this followed 'loose talk' induced by "drink" during a recent social gathering in Bunclody, Ireland. The occasion was the visit to Ireland of the curious Lois Colley and her lovely daughter Lauren.
