


CII member spotlight on Sheila Kalastree

Where are your offices located? In Singapore and Australia. How long you have been in business? The company has been in existence for over 32 years. I have been actively involved for the last 10 years. What's happening in your region? At the moment, investigations companies in Singapore are licensed. Investigators in most countries in Asia are not licensed, but this is changing. The security and investigations industry standards are constantly being reviewed for professional upgrading and improvements to the licensing criteria. However, credentialing is still in the infant stages. It is expected that there will be a prescribed course of study for investigators in the near future. The professional investigations courses available now in the region are all privately run, and there is very little training available.

What did you do before you were a private investigator? I was an event manager and conference producer in Australia. I organized consumer shows, trade shows, and sporting events and produced a range of conferences for senior management personnel. Do you have an interesting story about a particular case? Lots of them. One of the most fun was an undercover operation a couple of years ago. We needed evidence of a person's association in a business, so we induced her loyal staff to mention her involvement in a sensitive project without the staff knowing they were providing us with vital evidence to prove our case. The interview was conducted in Indonesia. Our cover story was that I was a wealthy boutique owner with a fashion house in Europe, and I was recruiting the targeted staff because of their skills. 
Saturday afternoon was spent on a cruise of the Seine where little known facts about Paris were dispensed like golden nuggets. We even circled the Ile



ASIS Asia Pacific Conference 5 – 7 February '07 Singapore

Singapore made its mark once again in the international security and investigations arena, playing host to the inaugural Asia Pacific conference for the American Society for Industrial Security (ASIS) International, held 5th to 7th February at Swisshotel, The Stamford, in Raffles City Convention Centre, Singapore.

ASIS is the world's largest security association with an international membership spanning over 30,000 members from both the government and private sectors.

The conference was an extremely successful event well attended by 300 security practitioners from the Asian region. It was officiated by Associate Professor Ho Peng Kee, Senior Minister, Ministry of

Home Affairs from Singapore. The keynote address was delivered by the Comissioner of Police, Singapore Police Force. Former Member of Parliament and Entrepreneur of the Year, Ms Claire Chiang, who is now President of the Singapore Compact for Corporate Social Responsibility, did the honors at the closing of the ASIS Asia Pacific conference.

The conference was a Orchid display at Singapore Airport mile stone event for ASIS International. It provided a

platform of business development and professional networking for members from the Asian countries – many of whom have not been able to attend the regular conferences in the USA and Europe. It also allowed Asian members to meet with the very dedicated members of the ASIS International team from the US headquarters led by the Executive Director, Mr. Michael Stack. This meeting would have been rare for Asian members who do not attend the annual ASIS conference held in the USA.

Themed Risks, Opportunities and the Future of Security in the Asia-Pacific region was the theme and there is an increasing recognition of Asia's growing economic potential and also its role in

combating the threat of terrorism facing the world today. The ASIS conference featured a range of highly relevant and empowering speaker presentations encompassing issues in Corporate Espionage, Intellectual Property, Physical and Electronic Security Design, Crisis Planning, Information Security, Gaming Security and Supply Chain Security.

Speakers included senior management representatives from the world's major corporations and consultancy firms such as Mr. Peter Coleman of Deloitte Singapore, Mr. David Patterson and David Johnson from The Steele Foundation, Mr. Al-Naim Faisal of Saudi Aramco. Richard Hancock of Hill & Associates Ltd, Alan Orlob of Marriott International Lodging, Mr. George McBride of Aon Consulting, Mr. Jack

> Chu of RA Consultants Ltd, Mr. Patrick Wang for Nokia (China) Investment Co. Ltd and others.

Ponno Kalastree, Regional Vice President, ASIS International Region 33 and committee member of the ASIS Economic Crime Council was involved in moderating 4 of the topics on: Security Issue in a Health Crisis: Business Continuity Planning for a Corporate Business to Survive a Potential Avian Flu -Photo by Kevin Ripa Pandemic in Indonesia; Corporate Espionage - a Grow-

Taking the mystery out of the romance

Background check of future mate a new age necessity

The day may come when running background checks on a roommate or romantic partner will be as common as getting an annual physical.

Several private investigators in Seattle -- reflecting on two recent cases in which women were killed by romantic partners who turned out to be disguising shady pasts -- find it difficult to believe that such searches aren't common practice already.

"If you're involved in a relationship that's going to affect your whole life, what could be of greater value?" asked Linda Montgomery, a private investigator in Ballard who believes that even people who are dating should be willing to share credit reports.

On Monday, a man known to police as Jonathan Rowan shot to death his ex-girlfriend, Rebecca Griego, in her office at the University of Washington. He then killed himself. Investigators say Rowan had two passports under different names and three aliases.

Last Thursday, a Gig Harbor man known to friends as John Williams shot to death Turid Bentley, the woman he lived with, in another murder-suicide. After searching the couple's home, police discovered that Williams was in fact John Branden, who was wanted in Oregon for kidnapping, raping and trying to kill a girlfriend in 1999.

And over the weekend, police arrested a 30-year-old woman, Lorelei Corpuz, who had passed herself off as a 17-year-old boy named Mark and persuaded an Everett couple to let her live in their home, where she sexually abused their 14-year-old daughter.

In all three cases, the victims were clueless about their partners' true identities. Friends and family members were also taken in by the hoaxes.

Though experts have access to databases that average citizens do not, there are measures that anyone can take to collect helpful information -- or at least confirm the veracity of what they've been told.

"I think it should become acceptable for people to say, 'Hey, I'm going to check you out.' It needs to be a thing like going to a doctor for a checkup," Montgomery said.

"My daughter met her husband on Match.com, and the first thing we did was background him."

Most of Montgomery's clients are corporate employers -for a private citizen, her \$500 fee is often too steep -- but there are basic searches that even those with limited means can run. "There are a bazillion public resources out there. It's just a matter of knowing how to use them," said Roger Dunn, a private investigator and former King County detective. State, federal and municipal courts in most jurisdictions put their records online, as does the King County Recorder's Office.

Public filings can indicate if a person has owned a home -- say, with someone of the opposite sex whom they've never mentioned, Dunn pointed out. "For free," he added, "someone could find out a lot about a person online if he took the time to do it."

For beginners, the investigator first advises a simple Google search, putting quotation marks around the subject's name.

"If the person's an ax murderer, there might be a newspaper article about them from their past," Dunn said.

Secondly, he suggests searching court filings in the states or counties where your subject has lived. This can turn up domestic violence assaults and other criminal charges, as well as divorces.

"It's all out there," Dunn said. "It's all available."

This assumes that a person has been truthful about providing a correct, searchable name and birth date. So to investigators, turning up nothing at all sounds more warning bells. Almost everyone leaves some sort of paper -- or electronic -- trail.

But if an Internet search provides nothing, common sense can reap volumes, Montgomery said. Listen to what people tell

you, she advised. Make a mental note and check it out.

"If someone says they work at wherever, pick up the phone and call them there," she said. "If they say, 'I've got a mother in so-and-so place,' look up her address." Above all, follow your hunches. Several years ago, she recalled, a father from out of state called, concerned about the man his daughter was dating. It was just a gut feeling, she said. After a court check, Montgomery found out about the man's divorce. In his file, she discovered allegations of domestic violence and learned his first wife had disappeared mysteriously.

"He wasn't charged with murder, but after we found the divorce records and spoke with family members, it became clear that this woman hadn't just 'disappeared' like he was telling everyone," Montgomery said. "That father got on a plane, met his daughter here and told her all the things we had found.

"Wow, that was really insane! I mean when that crazy woman with the 12 kids stood up and called my Jeffrey Todd? I mean does her elevator go all the way to the top floor?

She flew off with him and left that guy immediately."

Portugal's justice system scrutinized in McCann case



ment due to the alleged abduction of Maddie McCann there has been a great deal made of the 'Secrets of Justice' that operates in Portugal.

Basically it means that once an issue is in the Justice system then all information surrounding the issue can not be divulged to anyone outside the process.

With regard to a criminal investigation this means that the law enforcement agency carrying out the investigation can not give any information out to the media. This includes the name of any person they may wish to interview or any aspect of their enquiry. They can not say what is happening to forensic examinations or the result of them. If they take someone into custody they will not give any information out as to the identity of that person.



The main reason for this secrecy is to protect the investigation, so no information can get out to any person who may be involved

with the crime. Another reason is to protect the identity of

anyone that is suspected or eventually charged with an offence. There details are released at a later date if and when they are found guilty. This secrecy also includes civil cases. Although the parties involved in a litigation are named at the outset, once the papers are in the court obtaining further information can be frustrating of an investigator.

We know that A is suing B for 5000 euros. What we can not find out is what it was for, and when it is likely to come to trail. The legal process is so slow, a simple suing for non payment can take a few years to be finalised. It can then be almost impossible to ascertain what the outcome was without making contact with the plaintiff.

The present situation is certainly frustrating the foreign press, that are camped out in Praia Da Luz, the town that Maddie has disappeared from. This lack of information is certainly new to them and they do not like it.

I am sure that many law agencies throughout the world would welcome this situation in their own countries, as we all know there has been many an investigation ruined by press involvement or printing information that investigating officers would prefer to keep out of the public domain.

In reality in Portugal if the press find information that is martial to the investigation they should pass it to the police, once this has been done it is then subject to the secrecy laws.

One problem 'secrecy of justice' causes, is the press can speculate and report how an investigation is progressing, the Police can not make a statement correcting their articles. This then gives the public a false image of the truth.

There is now talk in the legal and government circles to look at the secrecy issue, hopefully they will end up with a fine balance that gives certain freedom to release information and protect the innocently accused.

Lies, Damn Lies, and Lawsuits

The purpose of this article is to provide a framework useful

in analyzing when a lie, told during the ordinary course of investigative business, might give rise to legal liability. We will be limiting our discussion to civil liability, but the elements of criminal liability are similar, varying mainly in the burden of proof.

Euphemistically Speaking

Most of us don't like to admit that we lie, so we use euphemistic words like 'pretext' or 'subterfuge' to describe our actions. There really isn't much difference between these two terms, since both involve some sort of overt 'false representation' or 'misrepresentation.'

The word 'pretext' is derived from Latin, its brother, 'subterfuge,' from French. Unfortunately, 'pretexting,' the euphemism that we use so frequently, has accumulated some ugly connotations these days. As William Safire wrote recently about pretexting in the *New York Times Magazine*, September 24, 2006:

"...Its origin is in the Latin *texere*, 'to weave, to fabricate'; from that came the metaphor 'to weave a web of lies' and 'to fabricate a story.' A pretext can be mild, a mere excuse or 'white lie'; it can also be synonymous with *pretense*, rooted in the Latin *tendere*, 'to stretch,' in this sense meaning 'to stretch the truth.' No matter how you stretch it, the new participle pretexting has an aura of dishonesty about it."

There has been a great deal of confusion both in the press and in recent congressional hearings about the meaning of the term 'pretext.' Though 'pretext' has sometimes mistakenly been used synonymously with the term 'fraudulent misrepresentation,' these two terms are definitely not interchangeable where the courts are concerned. Rather than the terms 'pretext' or 'subterfuge,' courts use the terms 'misrepresentation' or 'deceit' to describe that subdivision of the law of fraud that is based on a false statement. In other words, "The type of interest protected by the law of deceit is the interest in formulating business judgments without being misled by others..."

Reality Check

Whatever term we use, the important point to remember is that not every lie is fraudulent. Whether recognized or not, most people use some 'pretexting' every day in the normal business and social interactions. We all know about white lies used to spare another's feelings. And certainly no one would consider it to be unethical, let alone illegal, to tell the other party in a negotiation that 'X' is the final offer when, in fact, other offers will be made if the one on the table is refused. Business people engage in 'puffing' or 'trade talk.' Similarly, our vendors occasionally conduct pretexts to make sure that we are using their services within the limits of our contracts.

Weighing the Burden

Proving fraud is much more difficult then proving most civil injuries or breaches of contract. There is a stigma attached to the charge of fraud, and civil fraud is viewed as quasi-criminal, with the standard of proof in a civil fraud case lying between the stan-

dard for criminal fraud and the standard for most other civil cases.

Civil fraud must be proved by 'clear and convincing evidence' because the interests involved are deemed to be more substantial than the mere loss of money. This standard is more rigorous than the 'preponderance of the evidence' required in a civil case, but less stringent than 'beyond a reasonable doubt' necessary in a criminal case where a person's liberty is at stake.

Moreover, the party claiming civil fraud must take great care in describing the fraud when filing the initial Complaint. Ordinarily, a person bringing a civil Complaint merely has to give the other party notice that an injury or a contract breach is claimed. In a case of civil fraud, the fraud must be described in great detail.

Elements of Fraud

Unfortunately, there is no bright line that divides fraudulent lies from innocuous white lies. Fraud is an elusive term whose definition can vary from state to state, as well as from case to case. Generally speaking, a party claiming to have been defrauded must prove: (1) a false statement, (2) about a material fact, (3) made with the intent to deceive, (4) upon which the claimant relied, (5) and which resulted in damages to the claimant

False Representation. There must be a false statement (misrepresentation).

Example: If a person with whom I am communicating assumes that Ross Financial Services, Inc. represents investors or investment services, I don't have any immediate duty to explain the name of my company or the nature of my business. The law requires the other party to use reasonable care in determining facts, so there is nothing fraudulent here.

Materiality. A false representation is 'material' if the representation would have influenced a reasonable person in the claimants' position. Trivial misstatements, even though false, cannot provide a basis for a lawsuit claiming fraud.

Example: A New York buyer wants to purchase a derelict property located next to the expensive office suites that he is building. He does not want to disclose that he has an interest in purchasing the derelict property, fearing that the price would be jacked up unfairly. His representative, claiming to be a Washington, DC buyer, places the call to inquire about the property. It is unlikely that a court would find this representation to be 'material' and, thus, would not find that a fraud has been committed.

Deception. The false representation must be made with the intent to deceive the claimant. The party seeking damages for misrepresentation must have been personally misled, and must have personally relied on the false statement.

Example: Business A is interested in determining what financial incentives a county has offered to its competitor, Business B. Telephone contact is made to the county from an individual representing Business A, indicating interest in investing in that county. Since the call is to learn about financial incentives offered, and is made to the county, not to Business B, it is likely that this deception would not be found to be fraudulent. More-

cording to Chicago city authorities, some 200 wrecked planes rest at the bottom of Lake Michigan as a result of accidents during training. After WWII ended, Navy Pier became a two-

ing. After WWII ended, Navy Pier became a twoyear undergraduate campus to educate returning (Both the Navy Pier campus and UICC were part of the University of Illinois.)

• 1970s: During the first half of the 1970s, Navy Pier was neglected by the city. Then, in 1977, Navy Pier was designated a Chicago landmark. Slowly, Navy Pier began to be modernized (some people say the city thought Navy Pier could be used as a casino). Even though the casino idea never came to fruition, Navy Pier began to draw millions of visitors to its fests, and so in 1994, the City of Chicago paid for Navy Pier to undergo a

\$150 million renovation.

•2000s: Today, Navy Pier is Chicago's Number One attraction.

over, the misrepresentation may not even be material.

Reliance. The courts are in disagreement over whether a claimant must justify his or her reliance on a false material misrepresentation. For instance, in the District of Columbia, the courts follow the rule that reliance cannot be deemed 'reasonable' if minimal investigation would have revealed the truth.

Example: The borrower applied for a home mortgage through a lender. That lender referred the application to another lender, and the loan application was denied. The borrower claimed to have been defrauded by the false representation of the original lender indicating that it would be the entity to process the borrower's application. However, the court ruled that if the representation had been material to the borrower... that one lender rather than another process the application...it was the obligation of the borrower to determine the actual facts. Damages. The person to whom a misrepresentation is made must prove that he/she was actually injured as a result of the misrepresentation.

Example: An investigator pretends to be interested in investing in a Ponzi scheme that is being run by a judgment debtor. The pretext allows the investigator to obtain references from the debtor, thus uncovering where the judgment debtor banks. Most courts would find that the judgment debtor cannot then prove that he has been damaged by the misrepresentation, since the pretext was used to end the fraud that the debtor, himself, was committing.

Conclusion

Obviously, this is far from an exhaustive study of the subdivision of fraud known as misrepresentation or deceit. Moreover, it is not a matter of black or white. Different courts in other jurisdictions could conceivably view the examples above as supporting a finding of fraud, rather than agreeing with the courts

in the cases I have cited. Nor do I intend to provide legal advice about how any particular pretext would be viewed by a court or a jury. Welcome to the gray zone.

What I do hope is that this article provides you with a framework against which you can measure a pretext you contemplate using in your practice. Examine the pretext for the elements of a possible fraud case, and consider the difficulties an opponent would face in proving that you have committed fraud. Finally, as Sergeant Phil Esterhaus used to say on *Hill Street Blues*:

"Let's be careful out there."

The History of the Private Eye by: Ben Harroll – The PI Museum



Francois-Eugene Vidocq (1775-1857)

The World's 1st Private Detective Vidocq established "Le Bureau des




Renseignements" January 3rd, 1834, and had a colorful career. There's no argument that Vidocq's 1828 romantic Memoirs, served as source material for: Balzac, Dickens, Doyle, Dumas, Hugo, and Poe. The PI Museum collection includes a copy of the English translation of this fascinating personal account of the world's first Private Eye. Chicago Police Department. By 1849 he was their first Detective. In 1850, Pinkerton became a Private Eye, and quickly became a legend. Francois-Eugene Vidocq may have in part, inspired Allan Pinkerton. The English translation of Vidocq's exploits were widely distributed throughout America, and would have been familiar to Pinkerton.

Few contributions made by Private Detectives can rival Pinkerton's legendary work in saving President



Lincoln from assassination on the way to his inauguration. Pinkerton, at Lincoln's request, created the Secret Service and assured his own place in history. The PI Museum collection includes a copy of Pinkerton's study on the assassination attempt.

Artifacts: From the very beginning a Detective or Private Investigator needed a variety of "tools" that would allow him or her to be more productive in facing a variety of challenges. It is also, thankfully, true that yesterdays P.I.'s left us a rich collection of the day-to-day items that help us today to form a tangible record of what they did and how they did it.

International Detective's Conference

- St. Louis - 1889

This glass magnifier is 3" in diameter and 4/8" thick metal "event souvenir", made by and for a group of Private Eyes. They were even then making advances in the profession by coming together from all over the World. We are still enjoying this long heralded tradition over 100 years later. But who were they? Perhaps some of the working P.I.'s of today can eventually enlighten us all.



Expo Detective Watch Camera

This is a watch-style detective camera, circa 1905 in the U.S. and 1904 in Britain. It was patented by Houghton's and sold as the Tika. The cameras sold for \$2.50 new, and now are valued from \$250-\$500 or \$1,200-\$1,800, depending on the model. The lens is an achromatic type. The early model took 12 exposures. The picture is taken using the winding stem. The knob serves as the lens cap.
